RIGHT TO CONNECT PROJECT HEADING TO PARIS

Patrick Fitzgerald from Hazlewood will present his project on being a co-researcher at the AAATE conference in Paris. He is a co-researcher for the "Right To Connect" project, supported by Erasmus + funding and the Saint John of God Research Foundation. The core of this project? To support adults with intellectual disabilities to build digital skills.





How? By allowing them to play a pivotal role in designing elearning courses for their peers. These courses focus on building digital skills, particularly in apps and accessibility features, as chosen by our co-design teams across five EU nations. Patrick will share his unique journey as a co-researcher, talking about the assistive technologies that aided him, the hurdles he faced, and how he tackled them. Additionally, he will share some exciting findings from his research and what it's like to design a competency framework. EQUALITY AND HUMAN RIGHTS POLICY INTERACTIVE RESOURCES

A group from Liffey and Kerry Services took on the challenge last year to see how to make the Equality and Human Rights Policy more accessible and relevant for everyone in the service. The project, supported by Christina Doody, hired a Story coach, Ronnie, to upskill everyone in storytelling and Jackie, a drama coach, to help us stage the stories. The project is not finished yet, but we wanted to test out some of the accessible resources we made about Rights and the policy, so the team at Avila Day service gave their feedback on the interactive videos.

The group thought that the new interactive videos were good, but they had some great ideas, and lan Byrne and some of the co-designers from across Liffey Services will work with the DA team on improving it. Here, we see Amy using the interactive learning videos on the Flip touchscreen.













SAID Project Co-Designing DigiCoach Courses

It has been very exciting to get the chance to join the SAID project, where we are co-designing courses to support people in Liffey Services to become Digi Coaches and work in schools to upskill children in digital skills. This is great because it supports peer learning. Everyone learns from each other, showing how different people can work well together. The Digi Coaches help learners in ways they understand best, making everyone feel important and supported.

Making these courses is a bit tricky. We need to make sure they are accessible to everyone. We got some ideas from our earlier work with SJOG and looked at some courses by NALA, An Cosan, and the BBC to get more ideas.

We look forward to the Austrian atempo and University of Graz and Finish team from TryCamp coming to Dublin in September to work together to build the training material we need to support the Digi Coaches. There might be challenges, but this project will suit the Digi Coaches and the children in the schools.
